Giving voice to rural communities and values

Our democratic institutions are changing. Individuals and community groups are increasingly demanding and being given a direct voice in the deliberative processes.

While this is in the main a positive trend, in the world of participatory democracy the voices of the organised can easily shout-out those of the unorganised.

This is often the case on issues related to management and conservation of the environment. Traditional land users, including people in agriculture, forestry, fishing, honey-making, hunters, firewood collectors and recreational providers, as well as people who access and use the environment for recreations pursuits, are being disenfranchised.

While their voices and views continue to be represented in the formal institutions of democracy – by political parties, farmer organisations, and in the bureaucracy – their representation within civil society is weak. Indeed, the dominant voice heard from within civil society on the environment and on rural issues in general is urban based and at odds with those of farmers, fishermen, and other traditional users. While some environmental activists see modern farming, fishing, 4-wheel driving as a threat to the environment, traditional land users regard these activities as legitimate and, within reasonable limits, a valid means of making a living and enjoying nature which is not inconsistent with meaningful conservation.

There is a need for a balancing voice within civil society that represents the many people and communities who derive their livelihood or pleasures from using and conserving environmental resources.

To achieve this, the Institute of Public Affairs together with over 150 resource user groups, many with a strong community base, has established the Eureka Forum.

The aim of this inaugural meeting is to:

- Bring together community groups from across the country who share an interest in the use and management of environmental resources;
- Provide ideas, contacts and networks that enhance the capacity of these groups;
- Break down barriers between groups and enhance co-operation amongst them;
- Potentially begin the process of developing an institution to represent the member groups on a national basis in the deliberative processes, particularly in Canberra.

The inaugural Eureka Forum will meet in Ballart on the 3rd and 4^{th} of December - the weekend of the 150^{th} anniversary of the Eureka Stockade.
