Liberty & Society Student Outreach Programme

What is the Liberty and Society Student Outreach Programme?

Liberty and Society, is a unique live-in conference and alumni programme for undergraduates, postgraduates and recent graduates over the age of 18 who live in Australia, New Zealand or the South Pacific. The goal of the *Liberty and Society* conferences is to create an intellectual environment where ideas and opinions about what makes a free society can be discussed, argued and learnt.

The conferences consider the world from a 'classical liberal' perspective. This means exploring:

- How much individual freedom is possible?
- How much government do we need?
- What are the practical implications of reducing government?
- What are the necessary foundations to build a free, open society?

These issues and other topics are brought into focus with presentations by lecturers, question and answer sessions, group discussions and informal chats.

There are Student Outreach Programme consists of:

Introductory Liberty and Society Conferences -are open to all undergraduates, postgraduates and recent graduates over the age of 18 who have an interest in liberal ideas. **Advanced Liberty and Society** - open to people who have attended the Introductory conference, the Advanced conference has a slightly more practical bent with practitioners in government and business being involved.


Alumni Programme - open to people who have attended the L&S conferences.











What are the objectives of the Liberty and Society Student Outreach Programme?

- To develop the thinking of talented, productive young Australians and New Zealanders who are keen to support the ideas of individual choice, democracy and freedom.
- To engage students in the free flow of ideas and critical discussions across disciplines and vocations. *Liberty and Society* conferences providing an intellectual experience increasingly rare in Australian universities.
- To better equip young people who are interested in exploring the concepts of personal liberty, free markets, the rule of law, and limited government.
- To build a network of bright, motivated young people a number of whom will become the future leaders of Australia and New Zealand.

Eligibility to Attend and Selection Criteria

The conferences are open to all undergraduates, recent graduates and those studying higher degrees over the age of 18. The conference is not available to students in high school. Participants come from Australasia and they can be studying any subject. It is not a prerequisite to have a great deal of knowledge about classical liberalism. We are interested in people who are inquisitive about society and how it works.

Selection is made after reviewing:

- Curriculum Vitae
- University results
- A sample of the students' writing
- Career aspirations

- Information regarding contact they have had with classical liberal ideas
- Information regarding any community involvement they may have
- References

No single criterion is all-important. In the final selection procedure we ensure that there will be a good mix of backgrounds. The maximum number of students attending is 30. This allows all students to meet and get to know each other and also gives everyone an opportunity to participate and voice an opinion.

Programme Descriptions

Introductory Student Conference

- Liberty and Society Introductory conferences are run twice a year over a weekend from Friday night to Sunday afternoon. We select a maximum of 30 university students or graduates under the age of 30 and invite 4 full-time lecturers selected from academia and the business world to present lectures. The lecturers live in and are involved with the students throughout the whole weekend.
- The conference runs an intense and full programme. We tackle four important areas: Political Thought, Law, Economics and Social Policy.
- In addition to the lectures there are formal and informal group discussions on a variety of topics. These conversations continue late into the night and start again at breakfast.
- We select high quality students. We look for university students who are high academic achievers, are involved in their community and extra curricula university activities, come from a variety of political persuasion and have an open and inquiring mind.
- We aim to have students from many disciplines attending, as the opportunities at university for students to discuss ideas and issues with students from another field are very limited.
- Student scholarships are a critical element of the programme. The CIS believes the conference should be available to all students with no discrimination due to economic circumstances. Therefore we subsidise most of the costs of the seminar including travel if necessary.

Advanced Conference

- This programme has developed at the instigation of the *L&S* alumni who are now working. Many are very keen to get more practical advice and have discussions about how to apply the principles integral to maintaining and improving a liberal democracy within the constraints of the working world.
- This conference incorporates lectures, group discussions, presentation of student papers and more time for informal communication. It offers practical advice for dealing with government and bureaucracies, it looks at how language is used to persuade and capture public opinion and it also considers ways change can be achieved.
- The Advanced conference is a unique opportunity for young people to consolidate their thinking and grapple with the practical application of liberal thinking. The group who take this course are committed to exploring ideas and taking an active role in their workplace or community. We offer the opportunity for the attendees to write a paper to be presented and discussed. 4 papers are selected and critiqued by the group.
- As most of the attendees are no longer students, they pay their own travel costs. As most are in fact poorer than when they were at university (renting, running a car, buying work clothes) the other costs of the weekend are covered by the CIS.
